Bob said that the GARA picnic will be held on May 21st at Hagen Stone Park in shelter #4. Bob said that Brian Wilson, KJ4LKY, has asked for an invitation to put in the Feed line and that has caused Bob to wonder just who should be invited. After a bit of discussion it was decided that only GARA members and their guests should attend.

The date for the open house was discussed. Jim Waynick, N4JLW, has offered the fellowship hall at Hinshaw Methodist Church on October 1st or October 8th. Chris made a motion to hold it on the 1st with the 8th as a backup date, David seconded. The motion passed. Bob phoned Jim and the 1st was confirmed.

Gerald said that he thinks the club's projector that we use at meetings may need a new bulb soon and he will check to see how much time is left on it. Gerald also said for next month's GARA meeting he would like everyone to bring their favorite thing that they have preferably ham radio related.

Todd said that he has gotten some good response concerning increasing the use of the station at the Natural Science Center. Todd also said that there will be a work party out there soon to do some antenna work. Bob graciously donated a G5RV antenna for use at the center. The Board discussed finding a larger place to hold our monthly meeting's since we are filling up the room at the Golden corral. After a short discussion we decided to all look around to find another place that would meet our needs.

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Todd said that he would like to see some kind of discount program with local merchants.

Engineering Update for March, 2011



1) The VHF MASTR-II radio that was removed for repair last month has been repaired, and returned to service. Thanks to Arch, KT4AT, this radio is now working with excellent specs. The backup radio is slightly less sensitive

than this one, it has now been reset to the "backup" state.

2) As you know, we have been trying to track down the intermittent interference that has been heard on the VHF repeater. During this site visit, Arch measured interference coming into the antenna system. There is a wide

signal, about 800kHz wide, ranging from 144.15 to 144.95 MHz, which is basically sitting on top of the repeater input frequency. It does not look like a regular carrier, but more like a digital modulation of some type. A sweep of the site with a handheld transceiver, tuned to the repeater input (144.55 MHz) turned up some suspicious signals near some incoming buried cables. Whether this is the source or not needs to be confirmed, but there are several commercial users of the site that could be the culprits. At our next site visit (to update the club's asset inventory) we'll do some more snooping.



As you can see, this interference is pretty significant.

3) At the last club meeting, you, the club members, voted to purchase an engineering asset by the club, namely a Bird wattmeter with accessories needed to monitor and measure the transmitter outputs of both the 145.15 VHF and 442.8625 (D-Star) UHF repeaters. This equipment has been purchased, and is now in the possession of the club. It is located within a locked cabinet at the repeater site. Thanks to the club members for allowing the club to purchase this useful asset.

4) Arch has updated the D-Star software to his latest version, which

provides some additional diagnostic features (if there are problems in connecting to the internet gateway, it will announce the status over the air). We are fortunate to have many useful functions in our D-Star system that is not available from the standard ICOM offerings for D-Star repeaters.

5) Again, I would

like to acknowledge the efforts and expertise of Arch, KT4AT, in helping to get the primary VHF radio back on the air, and for keeping us up to date on the D-Star repeater.

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Real People: 5th-grade ham radio operator new **PIO**

"CQ, CQ, CQ, this is KJ4UBL." Christopher Tate, 11, calls attention to all operators on the wire and announces his own call sign from the comfort of his family's living room.

Tate, a fifth-grader at Burlington Christian Academy, has only been a licensed "ham" – or amateur radio

operator – since April 2010, but he's already quite proficient with his radio equipment. And as of this month, the young Burlington resident is the newest public information officer for the North Carolina section of the American Radio Relay League.

The ARRL is the National Association for Amateur Radio, and has licensed over 156,000 amateur radio operators in the United States. Tate earned his entry level "technician" license with his father and explained, "The FCC heads all the licensees," and there are three levels of licenses: technician, general and, "The ultimate level is amateur extra," he said. Tate has since upgraded to the general level.

When Tate first earned his technician license, he got his call sign, "KJ4UBL," and he said the number in the call sign corresponds to a certain area in the nation. "Most of the fours are in the southeastern U.S." Many of Tate's ham radio friends are in that area – including his father. Since he and his father were both licensed on the same day and it was obvious their signals were coming from the same house, they have what are called **March, 2011** "consecutive call signs."

Tate's father, whose call sign is "KJ4UBM," was the person who sparked Tate's interest in the hobby. Tate said his bookstore-wandering father came across an ARRL license manual about a year ago and purchased it for both him and his son to read. Tate said the book contained ham



radio's history, its basics and technical information, which prompted him to find another supplemental book that wasn't as "electronically advanced."

Tate was hooked as soon as he finished both books, and he and his father attended a "hamfest" in Raleigh shortly after. "It's kind of like a flea market," said Tate. "But it's devoted almost entirely to ham radio." At hamfests, Tate explained, major electronic companies like Icom, Yaesu, Kenwood and Alinco set up shop, as do individuals with equipment to sell. Amateur radio enthusiasts also set up their radios wherever they can, and Tate recalled it being in an empty warehouse. "We filled that place up," he said.

Tate said amateur radio equipment is also easily purchased online or in outlet shops specializing in ham radio, which is where he got his handi-talkie. The handitalkie is a more portable, two-way radio transceiver and Tate said he can reach other hams all the way in Chapel Hill. "I can talk to folks in Chapel Hill using a repeater, but using UHF," he said.

A repeater is a device that receives the weak or low-level signals from amateur radios and sends them back out at a higher level, allowing hams' messages to travel further distances. The term "UHF" stands for Ultra High Frequency, which is one of the frequency ranges the FCC allots to amateur radio operators. Tate said he usually "hangs out" on the VHF, or Very High Frequency, bands.

Tate said he gets on the wire whenever he has free time, but knows that many hams – including the president of Alamance Amateur Radio Club – is on the radio every day. Tate said the first time he attended the radio club, which is ARRLaffiliated, they met at the Burlington Police Department since it was in the late summer and the weather was hot. Their regular meeting place is at the city garage, where four radios are kept, and members often bring their own.

Tate is currently the youngest member of the Alamance Amateur Radio Club, and as the new PIO for the N.C. section of ARRL, he has a lot to plan for in the next couple of months. "In terms of duties, I establish a contact with local media," said Tate, and updates records every six months.

Raymond L. Woodward, ARRL public information coordinator for North Carolina, said he nominated Tate for the job after hearing the professional way he conducted himself on the radio. Woodward said he was impressed with how Tate spoke with adults, and pitched his idea to Bill Morine, the ARRL section manager for North Carolina.

Woodward described the history

of ARRL as "very egalitarian," since at its beginning, only Morse Code was used and an operator's age or gender was never obvious. Morine was also open to the idea and presented Tate's parents with the idea first, and then with their blessing, the job offer. Woodward said Tate is the youngest PIO for North Carolina, and probably in the U.S.

"I think he'll do a great job," said Woodward. "He's the kind of kid who's going to take the bull by the horns." And in June, Tate will be doing just that: educating the public on ham radio.

During the weekend of June 25-26, the ARRL's annual Field Day will be held, during which time amateur radio operators and enthusiasts invite the public to see what they do. "That's everybody's biggest day, (especially) if you're a PIO," said Tate.

According to the ARRL, approximately 35,000 individuals and clubs across the U.S. and Canada go head-to-head in sprint competitions, a contest in which hams compete to see who can make the most contacts on the radio in a given amount of time. The original purpose of sprint contests was to test hams on their speed and accuracy in setting up an outdoor radio station, in case they needed to make contact in an emergency. "That's what Field Day is – an emergency preparedness contest," said Tate. Tate is hoping Field Day will be held at the Joe C. Davidson Park again this year, and encourages those interested in ham radio to come out. He explained that there is always a GOTA – or "Get On The Air" – station that doesn't use the club's call signs, so non-hams can participate in the hobby. Licensed ARRL members will be there to help instruct budding operators, and Tate said ham radio is really for anyone.

The young operator encourages people of all ages to try out the hobby. He said it's not just for guys, either. Tate said one of his best ham friends is a girl in Chapel Hill who's part of the Orange County Radio Amateurs club. Tate said, "So long as you understand the rules and can talk with respect, it's open to you."
