
Al is originally from

Alan Bradley, KD4IUN, spoke about the soccer tournament coming up next weekend and asked that anyone wishing to use the repeater go through net control during the event.


Roger Stout, N4RWS, spoke about the Randolph county club will be operating a special event station on June 6th at the Asheboro air show.

to test out as a means of cutting down on the interference between the primary Field Day rigs. I plan to stay late Saturday and work CW through the night.

If you haven't participated in Field Day in recent years (or ever) I suggest you drop by. There's plenty to do even if you don't feel like operating. There's a need for loggers, people to answer questions and explain things to non-ham visitors. If you do want to operate some there's plenty of opportunity to give someone a break. Whatever your view of this event, one thing is certain. Field Day is a lot of fun. I hope to see you there.

appropriate licensing, the privilege of joining in the conversations spurred the interest in amateur radio. Al was first licensed in 1958. Initially he had the call, KN4ZKQ, with Novice band privileges valid for only one year. He also had K4ZKQ, Technician privileges, but renewable. After three trips to the FCC examination, he passed the 13 WPM code test and upgraded to General. Then about two years ago, he upgraded to Extra Class.


When asked about his radio equipment, Al states, "I operate an Icom 765 on the HF bands. I had a Standard twin Band in the car for VHF/UHF. I also have an Icom 706 Mk II G as a back up rig for all bands. It is the base station

for VHF/UHF. I am still trying to learn my way around my D-Star rig. It or the 706, or a handheld

may eventually be the mobile equipment. My all-time favorite antenna has been two element mono-band mini-beams for 15 and 20 meters. I had both of them on the chimney at our former house, but I haven't space for them at this QTH. The Icom 765 has an antenna tuner that enables me to use the 75 meter dipole on the higher bands."

Al's ham activities include participating in the North Carolina Single Sideband Net on 75 meters , Triad Sky Warn, and ARES. He uses his spreadsheet capabilities to report the club's financial forecasts and actual cash transactions.
