GYSA (Greensboro Youth Soccer Association) now Greensboro United Soccer Association host three (3) soccer tournaments throughout the year. They promote youth sports along with helping their association raise money for their efforts in putting on a wonderful exhibition of youth soccer.

Presently, we handle scoring and check to make sure remote sites have what they need to operate. A small tournament consists of 4 locations where games are taking place all day and most times with only a 15 minute intervals between games. Add on top of that there are close to 30 fields with play happening at any time on the first day. Not stressed yet? Add in 200+

The History of GYSA & GARA

The Wrangler Jeans / McDonald's Youth Soccer Classic is Greensboro Amateur Radio Association's longest running public service project. GARA has been closely involved with Greensboro Youth Soccer for 31 years.

In 1980, Morris Jefferys, K4SNI,

was the Tournament Director of a new soccer tournament. He had a challenge; there were no facilities in Greensboro with enough fields to support the number of teams invited to participate. He arranged to play on fields at various parks and schools

all over Greensboro. How could he coordinate the activities on all of these fields? He was also a very active member of GARA and the Trustee of the K4SNI club repeater on 146.61 MHz located on the Guilford College campus. Problem solved. With the help of Roy Smith, N4BYU, Richard Love, KD4TB, Bob Mays, KE4MOW, and other legends of ham radio in Greensboro, the tournament was a big success. It quickly grew to use every available soccer field in Guilford County.

The tournament was sponsored by the Greensboro News-Record for the first four years. All activities were coordinated by ham radio from a log cabin on Aycock street on the

Engineering Update for June, 2011

From David Macchiarolo, AJ4TF

VHF repeater interference: I have not heard anyone complain

about this for several weeks, nor have I heard it. If it returns again, we have some promising targets to check out based on previous measurements, as I detailed in this space a few months ago.

V H F Repeater ID: I received a call

from N4BYU, Repeater Trustee, regarding an anomaly that he observed a couple of weeks ago (I did not hear this). During a QSO, he heard the repeater transmit a CW ID, but it was truncated (i.e. not complete). After receiving this report, I monitored the repeater for several hours, and did not hear anything unusual. The repeater controller has programmed timers that ensure that the ID is transmitted every 10 minutes when the transmitter has been active, and during those several hours, a proper ID was transmitted every 10 minutes. What was the truncated ID that was heard? Perhaps one of the two Echolink stations that are tuned to this repeater had a user from somewhere else that had an issue with their ID? The source of this bad ID is unknown

100 Watts, Lousy Antenna – Update

As of May 26th, I achieved 100 country confirmations using Logbook of the World, and have earned DXCC. Some perhaps interesting observations from this pursuit:

I decided to actively chase DXCC in mid-February, and made the first contact towards this during the ARRL DX CW contest on February 19th. Between February 19th and May 26th, 86 different countries confirmed contacts – so only 14 of my total came from casual operation before actively chasing this award.



Contests provided a significant number of confirmations as shown below:

ARRL DX CW – 44 countries confirmed – Approx. 10 hours participation ARRL DX SSB – 20 countries confirmed – Approx 5 hours participation CQWW WPX SSB – 10 countries confirmed – Approx 2 hours participation

There were some duplicated countries between the different 'tests – but totaling about 55 new ones all together. Obviously, I did not dedicate a HUGE amount of time during contests – but I didn't ignore them, either.

Also, it should be obvious that

many of my confirmations were from non-contest contacts, and were from a mixture of modes – CW, SSB, RTTY, PSK – and each one of these modes provided at least some of the unique country confirmations.

My band and mode totals:

One final point – my CW totals are greater only because that's my mode of choice and I spend more time there than on other modes. Your own totals will reflect your preferences – but give strong consideration to expanding your arsenal by adding new modes – and also trying new bands.

Roger Bacon Alden, age 85, of 6600 Earnhardt Drive, Greensboro, NC, died peacefully, surrounded by his loving family Wednesday, June 8, 2011 in Moses Cone Hospital.

He was born in Danville, VA on May 6, 1926, a son of William Frank Alden and Clara McPeak Alden. Roger graduated from George Washington High School in Danville.

He was a Veteran of World War II and served in the United States Army Air Corps as a waist gunner on a B-24 bomber.

Weldon is featured on the Members and Friends of the Greensboro Radio Club video cassette tape 1 where he displays historical photos of the old club, the Civil Defense mobile station he configured and gives his amateur history into 1990. UNCG campus. The tournament was so successful that it quickly grew to be the largest and most popular in the Southeast. The sponsorship changed to Wrangler Jeans and McDonald's

> added their support a few years later. There were no cell phones, no FRS

> > radios and no computers. All communications were by ham radio

and all score tabulations were done by pencil and paper. Elizabeth House was a sports writer for the News-Record. She became the tie-breaker for the tournament until she moved to Hawaii in 1994. The rules used to determine which teams advance to semi-finals and championship games can be very complicated with closely matched teams. Now a computer gives the answer in milliseconds but back then Elizabeth was the authority. She persuaded her brother to create a database on his Apple IIe so the scores could be more easily tabulated and posted but it did not have the ability to break ties and calculate advancements. It also could not accept new score entry while it was printing a report. It took about 20 minutes to print so the radio operators just had to wait until it was finished.

GARA basically ran the tournament. Radio operators would arrive at the GYSA office on Lendew St. at 7:00 AM Saturday, pick up the game balls, corner flags, site manuals, coolers, ice, water, fresh fruit, match reports and anything else required and head for their assigned site. At the end of the day, hopefully before sunset because none of the fields were lighted, they would bring it all back and turn it in. The GYSA staff would work very late sorting it all out for Sunday

> morning when the whole y operation was repeated.

The first phase of the new soccer complex at Bryan Park was completed and that presented new challenges. Net control was clearly needed at Bryan Park.

That was the largest venue and also where the Tournament Director was most of the time. Scoring was located in the office on Lendew St. so control of the net was split between Soccer Control, George Blosser, N4CPV and Scoring, Dave Chesney, N4DFH. George had an amazing ability to

operate a radio in each hand while dealing with three or more people face to face at the same time. He answered everyone's questions and handled an amazing amount of traffic and never got flustered. Whenever an operator had scores to report he would turn the net over to Dave as needed. This is why the net control is variously called Soccer Control or Scoring depending on the nature of the traffic even today. Some of the "old timers" still remember when the two stations were miles apart. Dave was replaced by Madeline Bradley, www.w4gso.org

KD4SVJ, in 1993.

GARA had some membership turnover in the mid-90s. Howard Weinstein, K4CFI, was President in 1993. He didn't know Dale Kelly, WD4CVM and Orin Harding, WA4TBR were the organizing forces behind the 40 or more volunteer radio operators it took to handle the tournament at the time. Howard panicked when he saw the tournament approaching and asked Allen Bradley, KD4IUN, to round up some volunteers. This resulted in considerable confusion because Allen didn't know Dale and Orin either. When everything was settled, Dale and Orin were glad to retire from the tournament after the many years they had served and turn it over to Allen.

The real genius behind it all is Teri Barton. She was hired by GYSA about 1982 and has been behind the scenes ever since. Executive Directors, Board members, Tournament Directors and various volunteers have come and gone, but Teri is still behind the scenes organizing and teaching the newbies how to run a tournament. She would



schedule the games, prepare the match reports and handle most of the many details that create a successful tournament.

The tournament faced another challenge in 1995 when the GYSA Board

of Directors realized their best tie-breaker, Elizabeth, had moved to Hawaii.

With the grant provided by GYSA, we are able to offset the cost of maintaining the repeater, paying the insurance needed for equipment and events, and other perks we try



to provide for our members. These types of events are the core of why we exist and continue to thrive as a club.

With another tournament close to the same size as this past one scheduled for September 3&4 (Labor Day weekend), we need to start planning for manpower now. Just a few hours out of either one of these days will help take a burden off of the chairmen and also assist providing us with grant that benefits us all.
