# US Amateurs Now 700,000 Strong!

From ARRL

As the third quarter of 2011 came to a close, ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, began calculating the number of licensed Amateur Radio operators in the US, as well as the number

of new licensees. "At the end of September, I saw that the number of hams in the US was high," she said. "When I started comparing that number with other years, I found that it was an all-time high." For the first time, there are more than 700,000 radio

"When looking at the three current license classes -- Technician, General and Amateur Extra -- these numbers are impressive," Somma explained. "The number of Technicians peaked in March 2011 at 342,572, while in September 2011, we saw both Generals and Extras peak at 159,861 and 125,661, respectively. As new Technicians earn their Amateur Radio licenses, and current Technician licensees

#### Postage Rates to Increase in January

The US Postal Service has announced that as of January 22,

RATE

2012, the cost to mail first class letters, postcards and packages within the US will go up. The

cost to mail a first class letter will be 45 cents, an increase of 1 cent. According to the USPS, this is the first increase since May 2009. The cost of mailing a postcard will

be 32 cents, an increase of 3 cents. This is the second increase for postcard postage in less than a year; in April 2011, the USPS boosted the postcard stamp price from 28 cents to 29 cents. You will also pay more to send letters to Canada, Mexico and other international destinations.

#### Engineering Update for October, 2011

This month, we experienced some minor difficulties with our repeater equipment: we lost the phone line into the site for several days. The phone line is used both as the autopatch line for the VHF repeater, and also carries the DSL internet connection that is used for the UHF D-Star machine to link to other D-Star machines and carry D-Star voice and data traffic to the rest of the world. The first symptom was when the D-Star monitor web page (which anyone can view at https://65.13.128.238/) randomly dropped out, and randomly failed to update user's call signs when they keyed up the repeater. I have the capability to make a remote connection to the D-star system to troubleshoot it, and that connection also randomly dropped out, but I could see that the system was still running. The second symptom is that the autopatch on the 145.15 machine refused to dial out, and a call into the phone line always rang as "busy". At this point we were

convinced that the problem was the phone line. A trip to the repeater site confirmed that the phone line was not working, and the DSL connection was intermittent.

Roy, N4BYU, put in a call to Bellsouth/AT&T, and they located the problem, which was not actually at the site, but about 1/4 mile away from it. Everything is working normally now, and we have both autopatch capability, and internet connectivity.

A week before the GARA open house, Arch KT4AT, and myself visited the repeater site, and performed backups of the D-Star system, and checked the output power and SWR of both the VHF and UHF transmitters. We also observed and measured the receiver input noise floor on the VHF machine, and we did not see any signs of the interference that we were getting earlier this year. The SWR of the VHF antenna was about 1.3:1 with an output power at the duplexer output of almost 50

watts, which is normal for that antenna, the UHF antenna was very close to 1.0:1 with an output power of about 60 watts.

The macros on the D-Star repeater controller to automatically link reflector 30C and reflector 1C are still in use. The macros will link to 1C during

mid-day, and 30C during evening commute hours. As always, you can also manually link and unlink the repeater using over-the-air commands. If you have any questions on how to do this, I can demonstrate it or explain how to do this, it is not difficult at all.

For those of you with D-Star equipment, give a listen, and join in the conversations! For those of you without D-Star equipment, go get some... there are many options to get you on the air with D-Star!

average of 55 sessions a week. Today, we administer approximately 150 exam sessions each week, and our total number of licensees across all three license classes continues to grow each year."

In the past 40 years, the number of Amateur Radio operators in the US has grown at a remarkable rate:

A recent survey of ARRL members, however, indicates that more than 80 percent of those responding are active.


