October Engineering Update

The past month has been another slow month ham radio, and a very busy month at work. Traditionally a busy time of year for us anyway, coupled with a lot of training is making for longer hours. In turn I've been much less interested in radio and more interested in sleep!

I hope to get back on the bandwagon soon, there is still a lot of new DX showing up on the low bands and I've got a lot of things I want to get done for the VHF/UHF bands as well.

One thing I did pick up, in line with my last month's report is the RTL SDR dongle made by FlightAware. Another boutique RTL SDR dongle, made specifically for SDR use instead of DVB-TV reception, it is made by FlightAware for enhanced ABS-D reception. ABS-D is used by aircraft to transmit location on 1090 MHz. In conjunction with software you can plot aircraft location of any of you receive in your area, range depending on your setup. In my personal testing with a indoor portable antenna my average was around 70 miles, with a few further. FlightAware also sells a 1090 MHz bandpass filter that goes inline between the antenna and their dongle for enhanced reception by filtering out of band signals.

The Flightaware dongle is built well, has a built in preamp, and a SMA connector. They be picked up off Amazon.com for 17 dollars. The filter is 20 dollars. If not using their bandpass filter I would highly recommend using at least a FM broadcast band rejection filter to help with the RTL dongles reception.

I normally break my engineering report down to into two reports, one for each repeater. However this month I don't have much to report. I'm awaiting on the processor upgrade on the controller for the 145.150 machine, and the Dstar machine has been running well enough that it's not required my personal attention on the RF side. We did power cycle it once this month remotely which seems to help it on the RX side. Steve K4SQI and Scott KV4UP have been keeping up with the I.T. side of the business with the Dstar repeater, keeping up updated and running smoothly.

I have a few extra days off coming up soon and I plan on going out to make sure power out and SWR are still inline, looking for anything that needs to be done and a general cleaning of the area around the machines. One thing I will be listening for now that we are going into colder weather and lower humidity is if the perennial noise problem that we have on the VHF machine comes back this year. We did not have the DR1x online last winter, and it would be good information to see if something has changed.

AO-7 Still Going Strong after Almost 42 Years in Space

In a little more than a month, the venerable AO-7 Amateur Radio satellite will mark 42 years in space. AMSAT says AO-7, the oldest ham radio satellite still in operation, is now switching between Mode A and Mode B on a daily basis, after coming up in Mode A on September 30.

"That suggests that the satellite is now in constant sunlight and receiving enough power from the solar cells for the 24-hour timer to stay on throughout its entire orbit," AMSAT-NA Secretary Paul Stoetzer, N8HM, said. "Expect daily mode switches between Mode A and Mode B to occur for the next 3 months or so. As AO-7's orbit precesses and the periods of constant sunlight become fewer and fewer, there will be less of an opportunity to use Mode A on a yearly basis, so enjoy it while it lasts!"

In Mode A, earthbound amateurs transmit on 2 meters and receive on 10 meters. Stoetzer said the type of 10-meter antenna isn't fussy. "Try whatever you can," he said. When continuously illuminated, AO-7's mode will alternate between Modes A and B (70 centimeters up/2 meters down) every 24 hours.

November 15 will mark 42 years since AO-7 was launched into space from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California. AO-7 was the second so-called "Phase 2" Amateur Radio satellite that AMSAT-NA constructed and launched into low-Earth orbit. It



remained in operation until a short circuit occurred in a battery in 1981. More than 20 years later, however, AO-7 unexpectedly returned to life, its 2-meter beacon showing up on 145.9775 MHz. Satellite experts speculate that AO-7's resurrection occurred when the short circuit in the battery opened up for some reason, allowing the solar cells to power the spacecraft. When the satellite goes into eclipse, it powers down.

Last February Dave Swanson, KG5CCI, of Arkansas <u>achieved a distance milestone</u> on AO-7 using Mode B to work Eduardo Erlemann, PY2RN (GG66lw), in Brazil -- a path of 8030.895 kilometers. -- Thanks to AMSAT-NA. AMSAT News Service
