AM Rally on April 1-3 Weekend an Opportunity to Try a Vintage

Mode: If you're not familiar with full-carrier amplitude modulation (AM) or have never used it on the air, you'll have a chance during the <u>AM Rally</u> during the April 1-2 weekend, on the bands between 160 and 10 meters



(except 30, 17, and 12 meters) plus 6 meters. Once the primary voice mode on the ham bands, AM eventually gave way to SSB, a form of AM. Yet AM has remained popular among dedicated radio amateurs who consider it their primary operating mode. Many modern transceivers include an AM button. "Whether your rig is software defined, solid state, vacuum tube, hybrid, homebrew or broadcast surplus, you'll be a welcome part of the AM Rally," said Clark Burgard, N1BCG, who is spearheading the event with Steve Cloutier, WA1QIX, and Brian Kress, KB3WFV. The AM Rally starts on Saturday, April 1 at 0000 UTC (Friday, March 31, in US time zones) and concludes at 0000 UTC on Monday, April 3 Certificates will be awarded to high-scoring stations in each of five power classes, both for most contacts and most states/provinces worked. Odd Call Signs on the Loose -- Be on the Lookout!

Special event stations sporting unusual call signs are -- or will be -- on the air this spring and later in the year.

From Canada's Yukon Territory, keep an ear open for XO1X, now on the air for the remainder of 2017, with plans to be active March 25-27 for the CQ World Wide WPX (SSB) contest. The special call sign prefix is permitted as part of Canada's sesquicentennial celebration, as is XK150YUKON, another Yukon Canam Contest Club call sign for the sesquicentennial, operating VY1JA remotely. Operators will include Gerry Hull, W1VE/VE1RM, Cary Rubenfeld, VE4EA, and others. *Continued on page 5*

"The XO1 prefix has not been on the air in 35 years," Hull told ARRL. "My friend Andy, VE9DX, last put it on the air as XO1ASJ." That prefix block was subsequently moved to Yukon Territory, he explained.

<u>SKYWARN SPOTTER TRAINING ON CENTRAL CAROLINA SKYWARN</u> <u>INFORMATION NET (4/2, 4/11)</u>

SKYWARN Spotter Training will be offered on the Central Carolina SKYWARN Information Net on April 4th and April 11th at 9:15 PM on the 146.88 repeater (Wake County) and via live-streaming audio on the internet. Training will focus on the role of the SKYWARN spotter, weather safety, and convective basics. This training may be used to earn initial spotter certification or renew certification, which is required every three years. Part 1 of Basic Training will be held on April 4th; Part 2 on April 11th. The instructor will be Nick Petro, WX3H, Warning Coordination Meteorologist, NWS Raleigh. To fully benefit from this training and to receive certification, you must: a) download the training presentation before each net from www.centralcarolinaskywarn.net (it will be included with the Weekly Weather Impact Briefing, click on the Weekly Weather Impact Briefing on the top menu to download); b) listen and check in at the end of both nets; and c) email Virginia Enzor, NC4VA, Emergency Coordinator (Central Carolina SKYWARN) at nc4va@nc.rr.com with your name, call sign (if licensed), and preferred email address. The NWS will then contact you about completing the spotter certification process.

ARISS Deadline Looms to Accept Proposals to Host Contacts with Space Station Crew

The deadline is April 15 for schools and formal or informal educational institutions and organizations -- individually or working in concert -- to submit proposals to host Amateur Radio contacts next year with ISS crew members. Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (<u>ARISS</u>) anticipates that contacts will take place between January 1 and June 30, 2018. Crew scheduling and ISS orbits will determine the exact contact dates. Proposal information and documents are on the ARRL website.

To maximize these radio contact opportunities, ARISS seeks proposals from schools and organizations that can draw large numbers of participants and integrate the contact into a welldeveloped education plan. Each FM-voice contact lasts about 10 minutes -- the length of a typical overhead ISS pass from horizon to horizon.

Because of the nature of human spaceflight and the complexity of scheduling activities aboard the ISS, organizations must demonstrate flexibility to accommodate changes in contact dates and times.



In the US, ARISS is a collaborative effort between <u>ARRL</u> and <u>AMSAT</u>, in partnership with NASA and the Center for the Advancement of Science in Space (<u>CASIS</u>).

March Engineering Update

As I type this, the CQWW DX contest is going, the weather it's nice and sunny outside, and I have the entire weekend off for the first time in a few months that I can remember. A rare but fine moment in the alignment of good things.

I'm looking forward to the release of Yaesu's upcoming FT-70DR HT, it looks to be an affordable dual band, single band at a time on the display, FM/C4FM HT that has a large battery capacity and a nice loud audio output, which is nice for people like me that are hard of hearing. It slightly reminds me of the FT-65, and I like that it's loud like the VX-177 that I have, which is probably the toughest built amateur radio HT that I own that also has a loud audio output and a large battery. Maybe by this time next month I'll be typing a review of it.

The engineering committee focused on the 145.150 VHF repeater again this month. A few weeks ago on a nice Sunday morning Matt KM4QPU, Cameron AJ4TW and I went out to the repeater site to adjust audio, deviation and levels of the PL tone on the controller. Cameron has a nice shack full of testing equipment so he brought along a spectrum analyzer and signal generator so we could get the job done. We set the deviation to just over 4.5 kHz and the PL tone deviation to 650 Hz. We also found that de-emphasis was incorrectly set on the controller so that was fixed as well as adding a slight bit of delay to the audio.

With the audio being delayed, end users now do not hear a squelch tail at the end transmissions if the signal is decently strong, as the audio gate in the controller clamps down, and with the delay it is effectively chopped off. However if someone has a weak signal into the repeater, like I discussed last month, the squelch will add a longer delay before it clamps down. So in most cases if you unkey, and hear a quick squelch tail or hear it on another signal you'll know why. This is detected by the squelch circuit by the audible white noise it hears above 4000 Hz, with delay being added if it hears a lot of noise.

Due to the VHF repeater being our main repeater, and with others down due to problems in the area, we decided to go ahead and acquire a second DR1x repeater, to complete the install on VHF and put us back to where we were before, with a ready to go back up on site if something happens to one of the repeaters. In the past, with the GE Master II setup this is what we had, and it came in handy a few time. Each repeater has its own built in controller that we could use, in case something happens to the controller, so we have a good chance of weathering hardware failures in the future with minimum down time if needed.

Going forward we hope to flesh out the Scom controllers programming, adding some actual voice announcements, getting the PL timing set correctly to drop just before the transmitter does, programming an echo test macro for users, WX alert receiver hooked to the controller and having feedline play from the repeater site through the controller instead being transmitted to it every week.

Nayif-1 Amateur Radio Satellite Transmits Message from Dubai's Ruler: The *Nayif-1* Amateur Radio satellite is beaming a message from Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid, Vice President and Ruler of Dubai -- the first to be transmitted by the new satellite. AMSAT-NA has designated *Nayif-1* as Emirates OSCAR 88 (EO-88). The message, in Arabic, says, "The renaissance of peoples, nations, and civilizations starts with education; and the future of nations starts at their schools." Launched on February 15, the

Nayif-1 satellite carries a U/V linear Amateur Radio transponder for SSB and CW and a telemetry transmitter. *Nayif-1* was a joint project of the Mohammed bin Rashid Space Centre (<u>MBRSC</u>) and American University of Sharjah (<u>AUS</u>). It is the United Arab Emirates' first nanosatellite. Telemetry is on 145.940 MHz, 1.2 kb BPSK (FUNcube standard). The SSB/CW transponder uplink passband is 435.045-435.015 MHz, and the downlink passband is 145.960-145.990 MHz.

Special Achievement Award

S. Ram Mohan, VU2MYH, of Hyderabad, India, will receive Hamvention's 2017 Special Achievement Award. Mohan is the Executive Vice Chairman and Director of the National Institute of Amateur Radio (NIAR) in Hyderabad, India. Licensed since 1988, he has conducted a number of experiments on HF and VHF communication equipment and carried out propagation tests, organized training programs, DXpeditions, workshops, and general Amateur Radio activities, including public service communication.
